HOT OCCUPATIONS: January 1 to March 31, 2014

Hot Occupations highlights the number and types of vacancies available to jobseekers from analysis of advertisements in the *Gleaner* and *Observer* newspapers as well as online job placement websites. For the period January 1 to March 31, 2014, a total of 4,719 vacancies were posted in the media (See Table 1). The review showed that the most frequently advertised positions were Sales Representative and Salespersons (See Table 2).

Advertised Vacancies by Occupational Group

Table 1 indicates that the majority of the vacancies advertised belonged to the following occupational groups:

- 1. "Professionals, Senior Officials and Technicians" with 1,765;
- 2. "Service Workers, Shop and Market Sales Workers" with 1,397;
- 3. "Clerks" with 545.

Top Ten Occupations:

The two dominant groups in the 'Top Ten Occupations' for the quarter January 1 to March 31, 2014 were:

1. Service Workers, Shop and Market Sales Workers which includes:

Security Officers/Guards, Chefs/Cooks, Bartenders and Masseuse (See Table 2)

2. Professionals, Senior Officials and Technicians whose 'hot' areas comprised:

- Managers [Restaurant, Operations, General, Sales and Assistant]
- Officers [Field, Credit/Customer Relations, Collections/Bailiff, Marketing, Medical, Legal, Inventory, Project]
- Teachers [English Language, Mathematics, Special Education, Music, Spanish, Early Childhood]
- Supervisors [Restaurant, Security, Housekeeping, Maintenance, Production, Gas Station]

Hottest Vacancies January 1 to March 31, 2014 and October 1 to December 31, 2013

The October 1 to December 31, 2013 and January 1 to March 31, 2014 quarters were similar as Sales Representative and Salespersons tallied the highest. (See Table 2). Other notable vacancies during the quarter were Security Officers, Chefs/Cooks, Bartenders and Drivers.

Vacancies By Industry

Most of the vacancies during January 1 to March 31, 2014 or approximately fifty nine percent were linked to the "Other Community, Social and Personal Services", "Hotels and Restaurants", "Wholesale & Retail, Repair of Motor Vehicles, Motorcycles and Personal and Household Goods", "Manufacture" and "Education" industries. Table 4 lists the top ten vacancies that were found in each industry.

Work Permit Approvals

A work permit is mainly approved on the premise that local workers in specific occupations are in short supply. Demand for work permits during the January to March 2014 quarter was primarily for persons in the "Professional, Senior Officials and Technicians" category. An examination of approvals granted showed the top ten occupations were:

- 1. Managers (that is Department and General Managers)
- 2. Working Proprietors
- 3. Other Construction Workers
- 4. Cooks/Chefs
- 5. Supervisors
- 6. Engineers (that is Civil, Electrical and Telecommunications)
- 7. Technicians/Repairmen
- 8. Construction Labourers
- 9. Directors
- 10. Cable/Telephone Workers

Vacancies Advertised via The Internet

The total number of jobs posted on the electronic job-matching services from January to March 2014 was 392. The three websites which were monitored are SplashJamaica.com, Electronic Labour Exchange (ww.lmis.gov.jm) and CaribbeanJobs.com. The top ten occupational areas and the related positions are listed in Table 5. A large number of

the vacancies advertised via the internet were a part of the "Professionals, Senior Officials and Technicians" occupational group.
